TO BE ENTITLED: "AN ORDINANCE TO REVISE CERTAIN CHAPTERS OF THE FRANKLIN ZONING ORDINANCE IN ORDER TO CREATE A SCIENTIFIC RESEARCH OVERLAY **ZONING DISTRICT."**

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF MAYOR AND ALDERMAN OF FRANKLIN, TENNESSEE, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION I. That Chapter 3, Table 3-10 of the City of Franklin Zoning Ordinance is hereby amended to add the following text noted in **bold** and is approved to read as follows:

SECTION II. That Chapter 3, Section 3.4.9 of the City of Franklin Zoning Ordinance is hereby created with the following text noted in **bold** and is approved to read as follows:

SRO-- Scientific Research Overlay 3.4.9

Purpose (1)

The purpose of the Scientific Research Overlay (SRO) is to allow areas for the concentration of scientific research facilities and related uses in a campus-like setting to enable the provision of a wide range of scientific services to enhance the public's health, safety and general welfare. The overlay is intended to provide sites for the location of such enterprises in an attractive, master planned setting. It is the intent of the provisions of this section to establish an overlay district in which scientific research facilities, pilot and prototype production facilities, or other operations requiring a high degree of scientific input will be permitted.

The SRO shall be limited to the Civic and Institutional (CI) and Light Industrial (LI) Zoning Districts.

(2) Permitted-uses

Hospitals, Rehabilitation Centers, research laboratories, essential services, passive parks and open space, and accessory-uses, as defined by Section 4.1.

(3) Prohibited-uses

The development of uses, except those permitted in Subsection 3.4.9(2)(a) above, shall be prohibited.

SECTION III. That Chapter 8, Table 8.1 of the City of Franklin Zoning Ordinance is hereby amended to add the following text noted in **bold** and is approved to read as follows:

Zoning District

Purpose

The purpose of this memorandum is to provide the Board of Mayor and Aldermen (BOMA) with information regarding the revising of certain chapters in the *Franklin Zoning Ordinance* to create a Scientific Research Overlay Zoning District.

This text amendment was recommended unanimously by the Planning Commission at the September 24, 2009 FMPC meeting.

Background

This *Zoning Ordinance* Text Amendment is proposed to revise both the *Zoning Ordinance* and the *Zoning Map* in order to create a new Overlay Zoning District. This overlay district would provide a tool to better control those proposed uses in Planned Unit Developments (PUD) that are related to scientific research and development. This overlay district is tied to the Civic and Institutional (CI) Base Zoning District and would limit the permitted uses to only scientific and research related-uses, while excluding all other uses allowed in the CI Base Zoning District.

This Scientific Research Overlay District (SRO) could be requested by an applicant or prescribed by the city to better ensure that a PUD, which includes scientific research and development, is located and developed according to all city standards, while reducing, as much as possible, any negative impacts to adjacent neighbors or property owners. The Planning Commission struck a provision to prohibit any uses that required Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation (TDEC) approval at their September meeting.
