All beer applications must have a training policy submitted with application. This policy must include training regarding the sale of beer to minors.

19. Please read the following and upon signature of this application, you do understand and agree to comply if you are granted a permit.
- (a) You will not sell beer or similar beverages except at the place or places for which the beer board has issued your permit.
 - (b) You will not sell beer or any like beverage except in accordance with the terms of said permit.
 - (c) If this application is made for permit to sell and not for consumption on the premises, you will not sell for consumption on the premises and not allow consumption on the premises.
 - (d) You will rigidly enforce the law against sales to minors.
 - (e) You will prohibit gambling at your establishment and understand that the conduct of such activities on the premises will result in revocation of your permit.
 - (f) You will secure a certificate or statement from the health department or health officer that the premises covered by the application meet the requirements of the ordinances of the City of Franklin and the laws of the State of Tennessee.
 - (g) You will not attempt to transfer this permit to anyone else.
 - (h) You will display this permit in a prominent place in your establishment.
 - (i) You will not sell or distribute beer between the hours of 3:00 AM and 6:00 AM (8:00 AM for on premises consumption) during the week and between the hours of 3:00 AM Sunday and 12:00 Noon Sunday (10:00 AM for on premises consumption).
 - (j) You will prohibit the congregation at your establishment of those who reasonably appear to be intoxicated, lawless, rowdy, or prostitutes.
 - (k) You will not allow any liquor with alcoholic content of greater than five percent (5%) to be consumed on the premises.

- (l) You will not allow any sale or delivery of beer for consumption on the premises outside of the building, it being the intention to prohibit the sale of beer by what is commonly known as "curb service" or "curb sales" of beer.
- (m) You will comply with all requirements of section 2-201 through 2-229 of the municipal code of the City of Franklin.

A non-refundable \$250 fee must accompany this application and the application shall be submitted at least fifteen (15) days prior to the Beer Board meeting at which it is to be considered. If the application is approved you are required to provide documentation of sales tax registration to the city within ten days of approval. Any applicant making false statement in this application shall forfeit his permit and shall not be eligible to receive any permit for a period of ten years.

A privilege tax of \$100 is imposed on the business of selling, distributing, storing or manufacturing beer in this state effective January 1, 1994 and each successive January 1. Any holder of a beer permit issued after January 1, 1994 shall pay a pro rata portion of this annual tax when the permit is issued.

I hereby make application to the City of Franklin Beer Board for a beer permit.

The signing of this application acknowledges that I am aware of the laws prohibiting the sale of beer to minors.

I hereby certify that no person having at least a 5% ownership interest, nor any person to be employed in the distribution or sale of beer in my establishment has been convicted of any violation of the beer or alcoholic beverage laws or any crime involving moral turpitude within the past 10 years.

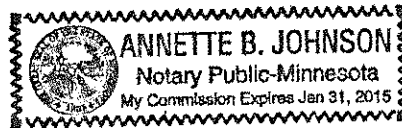

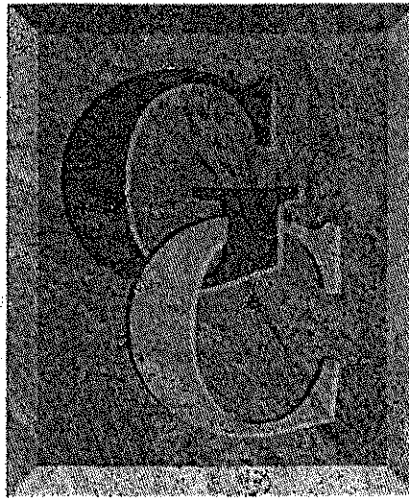

SALES & SERVICE

Let's start off with the basics. What is a drink?

A standard drink is:

- One 12-ounce bottle of beer* or wine cooler
- One 5-ounce glass of wine
- 1.25 ounces of 80-proof distilled spirits.

*Different beers have different alcohol content. Malt liquor has a higher alcohol content than most other brewed beverages.

BAC Levels

It may surprise you to learn that you don't need to drink much alcohol before your driving ability is affected. For example, certain driving skills can be impaired by blood alcohol concentrations (BACs) as low as 0.02 percent. (The BAC refers to the amount of alcohol in the blood.) A 160-pound man will have a BAC of about 0.04 percent 1 hour after drinking two 12-ounce beers or two other standard drinks on an empty stomach (see the box, "What Is a Drink?"). And the more alcohol you drink, the more impaired your driving skills will be. Although most States set the BAC limit for adults who drive after drinking at 0.08 percent, driving skills are affected at much lower levels.

Alcohol and Driving

Alcohol has a big effect on the way people drive. Many studies show that the risk of being involved in a crash increases as a driver's blood alcohol level increases. As the blood alcohol level rises, the risk rapidly increases. In fact, if you drink and drive (with a blood alcohol level over 80mg per 100ml) you are three times more likely to be involved in a crash than a sober driver. Contrary to popular opinion, people with a high blood alcohol level are more likely to be injured or killed in a crash than those who are sober.

An average 170-pound man must have more than four drinks in one hour on an empty stomach to reach a .08 percent blood alcohol concentration (BAC) level. A 137-pound woman would reach .08 BAC after about three drinks in an hour on an empty stomach (National Highway Traffic Safety Administration) - a level that exceeds what is commonly accepted as social drinking.

How does alcohol affect the human body?

When someone drinks an alcoholic beverage it flows into the stomach. While it is in the stomach, the drinker does not feel the effects of the alcohol, but alcohol does not remain in the stomach very long. Some of it is absorbed through the stomach walls into the bloodstream, but most alcohol passes into the small intestine and then into the bloodstream, and this circulates throughout the body. Once alcohol is in the bloodstream it reaches the brain and the drinker begins to feel its effects. The reason that a large person does not feel the effects of a drink as quickly as a small person is because the large person has more blood and other body fluids and will not have as high a level of alcohol in the blood after drinking the same amount of alcohol.

How does alcohol affect the brain and your ability to think?

Alcohol acts directly on the brain, and affects its ability to work. The effects of alcohol on the brain are quite complex, but alcohol is usually classified as a depressant. Judgment is the first function of the brain to be affected; the ability to think and make decisions becomes impaired. As more alcohol is consumed, the motor functions of the body are affected.

The effects of alcohol are directly related to the concentration (percentage) of alcohol in the blood; however, the effects vary among individuals and even in the same individual at different times. In the following description, the blood alcohol concentrations (BAC) are those that would probably be found in a person weighing about 150 pounds:

- At a BAC of 0.03% (after about one cocktail, one glass of wine, or one bottle of beer), the drinker will feel relaxed and experience a slight feeling of exhilaration.
- At 0.06% (after two cocktails, two glasses of wine, or two bottles of beer), the drinker will experience a feeling of warmth and relaxation; there will be a decrease of fine motor skills and he or she will be less concerned with minor irritations.
- At 0.09% (after three cocktails, three glasses of wine, or three bottles of beer), reaction time will be slowed, muscle control will be poor, speech will be slurred and the legs will feel wobbly.
- At 0.12% (after four cocktails, four glasses of wine, or four bottles of beer), his or her judgment will be clouded, inhibitions and self-restraint lessened, and the ability to reason and make logical decisions will be impaired.
- At 0.15% (after five cocktails, five glasses of wine, or five bottles of beer), vision will be blurred, speech unclear, walking will be unsteady, and coordination impaired.
- At 0.18% (after six cocktails, six glasses of wine, or six bottles of beer), all of the drinker's behavior will be impaired, and he or she will find it difficult to stay awake.
- At a BAC of about 0.30% alcohol in the blood (after 10 to 12 drinks), the drinker will be in a semi-stupor or deep sleep. Most people are not able to stay awake to reach a BAC higher than 0.30%.
- If the BAC reaches 0.50% the drinker is in a deep coma and in danger of death. As the alcohol level reaches 1% in the blood, the breathing center in the brain becomes paralyzed and death occurs.

In most states a BAC of 0.08% is considered legal evidence that a driver is intoxicated.

Granite City Food & Brewery Responsible Alcohol Sales & Service Policy:

1. We support the enforced legal drinking age of 21 in Franklin Tennessee.
2. We will continue to promote liquor responsibly where the competitive conditions dictate such promotions.
3. We will continue to provide training for our associates so they will intervene with any Guests who may be driving or who are drinking excessively in our restaurants.
4. We support the implementation of effective DWI laws. We also continue to encourage pre-sentence screening and treatment to identify and help abusive drinkers.
5. We strongly support intervention and treatment for those persons who have the disease of alcoholism. We financially support and encourage private sector program initiatives in the area.
6. We will manage responsible liquor operations that build sales and profits for the long term.
7. We believe our Guests have a high degree of self-responsibility.
8. We have a professional responsibility to effectively manage our Guests who have been drinking.
9. We will manage responsible liquor operations that build sales and profits for the long term.
10. Do not allow minors to consume alcoholic beverages in the restaurant.
11. Handle any liquor related situations before they become a problem.
12. Do not allow intoxicated Guests to drive.
13. Provide transportation (a taxi) for any intoxicated Guests.
14. Contact the proper authorities if there are legal ramifications involved.
15. To engage in continued liquor awareness programs for the management and the staff
16. To enforce and uphold all Granite City and state laws pertaining to the service and or consumption of alcoholic beverages
17. To card everyone appearing under 40 that orders an alcoholic beverage.
18. To be aware of the amount of alcoholic beverages that a Guest is consuming.
19. To be aware of the effect of over serving a Guest, and the laws that govern this.

Liquor Service Times

As we operate in several different states, it is important that you all understand when we can legally serve alcoholic beverages in our restaurants. Below is a guideline of these service times per state or city ordinance.

MN - Monday through Saturday, 8:00 a.m. until 1:00 a.m. Sunday; 10:00 AM until 1:00 a.m. 2AM closing all days

Iowa - Monday through Saturday, 6:00 am until 2:00 am. Sunday, 8:00 am until 2:00 am (with Sunday sales privilege).

Illinois – Varies by city.

1. Rockford - Sunday 9 a.m. – 2 a.m. The ordinance was recently amended –changing these hours Monday – Saturday 6 a.m. – 2 a.m., Private Clubs can begin sales at 8 a.m. on Sundays
2. Orland Park -No alcohol can be served on premises between the hours of 2 a.m. and 7 a.m. week days; and No alcohol can be served on premises between the hours of 2 a.m. and 11 a.m. on Sundays.
3. East Peoria - One o'clock (1:00) a.m. Monday and six o'clock (6:00) a.m. Monday;
 One o'clock (1:00) a.m. Tuesday and six o'clock (6:00) a.m. Tuesday;
 One o'clock (1:00) a.m. Wednesday and six o'clock (6:00) a.m. Wednesday;
 One o'clock (1:00) a.m. Thursday and six o'clock (6:00) a.m. Thursday;
 Two o'clock (2:00) a.m. Friday and six o'clock (6:00) a.m. Friday;
 Two o'clock (2:00) a.m. Saturday and six o'clock (6:00) a.m. Saturday;
 Two o'clock (2:00) a.m. Sunday and twelve o'clock (12:00) noon Sunday.

Indiana - Monday through Sunday, 7:00 am until 3:00 am. No sales on Christmas Day.

Kansas - Alcoholic Liquor: Sunday through Saturday 9:00 a.m. until 2:00 a.m

Michigan - Monday through Saturday, licensed establishments may serve alcohol between 7:00 a.m. until 2:00 a.m. Sunday service is permitted from 7:00 a.m. until 2:00 a.m. Monday, but additional permits are required for early sales and Sunday sales. Annual permits must be purchased from the MI Liquor Control Commission.

Missouri - Monday through Saturday, 6:00 a.m. until 1:30 a.m. Sunday, 9:00 a.m. until 12:00 a.m., additional license required.

North Dakota - Monday through Saturday, 8:00 a.m. until 2:00 a.m. Sunday, 12:00 p.m. until 2:00 a.m. No sales after 6:00pm Christmas eve and Christmas day.
