1. Call to Order

Mayor Ken Moore called the August 26, 2014, meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

2. Invocation

The invocation was given by Alderman Clyde Barnhill

3. Pledge of Allegiance

All present stood and pledged allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America.

- 4. Grievances or Statements from Citizens: Citizen Comments (Open for Franklin citizens to be heard on items not included on this Agenda. As provided by law, the Board of Mayor and Aldermen shall make no decisions or consideration of action of citizen comments, except to refer the matter to the City Administrator for administrative consideration, or to schedule the matter for Board consideration at a later date. Those citizens addressing the Board of Mayor and Aldermen are requested to come to the microphone and identify themselves by name and address for the official record)
 - Matt Dobson, 2020 Hillsboro Road, Franklin, said the Harpeth River has been impaired since 2002 and cited causes as effluent discharge and the sewer treatment plant. How is the City measuring that impact?
 - Laurie Bruno, 388 Sims Lane, Fieldstone Farms, Franklin, is a ratepayer for water and sewer. She kayaks and appreciates the access to the river. The river needs to meet water quality standards. It cannot be used from May to October because of the chemical odor, and sewer overflow. The river is dirty with trash and appliances. There is algae behind Bicentennial Park, and steel beams are in the river. Use the

river as an asset to bring more dollars. If it is more beautiful more people will use it. Make sure the river meets state regulation standards.

• John Mattox, 1182 Westhaven Boulevard, Franklin, said he is a taxpayer and water ratepayer. He asked the City to protect the Harpeth and to abide by state and federal standards so the river is viable for years to come. He owns Paddle Dog Adventures. Some areas are more beautiful than others such as the West Harpeth. He would like to showcase downtown, but the treatment plant and trash are a hindrance. Solid waste is a concern. He mentioned the standards on how much water can be taken out for drinking water and how much can be put in. Protect the resource.

5. Communications from Williamson County Mayor and Williamson County Commission

There were no commissioners present.

6. Approval of Minutes

Alderman Blanton moved to approve the August 12, 2014 Work Session and August 12, 2014 Board of Mayor and Alderman minutes as presented. Seconded by Alderman Barnhill. Motion carried unanimously 7-0.

7. Recognitions

▶ <u>Service Recognition:</u>

The Honorable Tom Taylor, Judge of the City of Franklin Municipal Court Mayor Moore thanked Judge Taylor for his 27 years of presiding over City Court with honesty and fairness, and presented him with a plaque commemorating the occasion.

Shauna Billingsley, City Attorney, presented Judge Taylor a framed memento that was signed by all who attended the reception held for him earlier in the day at City Hall.

Judge Taylor said he appreciated all the attention during the last few days. He declared this was the best job a lawyer could have in the entire world. He compared it to being like the judge at Disney World. He added that he loved everybody at the City of Franklin and Franklin is a marvelous City to work for.

▶ Proclamation: The American Cancer Fund for Children and Kids Cancer Connection Mayor Moore read a proclamation recognizing the American Cancer Fund for Children, Inc. and Kids Cancer Connection, Inc. as being dedicated to helping children with cancer and their families for over 25 years. Mayor Moore proclaimed September as Childhood Cancer Awareness Month in Franklin, Tennessee.

8. Miscellaneous Reports

➤ Eric Stuckey, in answer to those who spoke during citizen comments, related the City has a large amount of detailed information available for review by the public: City wastewater treatment functions; the entire Integrated Water Resource Plan; answers to common questions, including the City's performance against permit standards which are established to be protective of the receiving water; and, a

summary of the City's 23-page response to the Harpeth River Watershed Association's concerns expressed at the first of the year presented to the Board of Mayor and Aldermen in March.

Mr. Stuckey emphasized the City's performance is exceptional compared to the permit's performance standards.

City officials are willing to meet with those who have questions and to explaining how the City operates and what is being done in planning for the long-term viability of the community and it river. He urged people to look at the information that is available to them.

➤ Alderman Dana McLendon referred to a packet received today from the Harpeth River Watershed Association, including their complaint for declaratory and injunctive relief and civil penalties, as well as a lot of propaganda. He said it occurred to him the HRWA has gone out of its way to advise that any penalties would not be paid to the HRWA rather they would be paid to the government, But, on page 51 of the complaint filed yesterday by the HRWA, at paragraph 200 the HRWA demands that the court order an award of litigation costs including reasonable attorney fees and expert witness fees. Alderman McLendon continued that if the HRWA wants to be a white knight, and a do-gooder, then strike that demand. Otherwise, don't tell people that you're not in it to get fines and fees awarded to the HRWA. Do it without asking for fees and expert witness fees. Then come back and tell me you're a white knight.

Alderman Barnhill moved to **deny**, per staff recommendation, MOS 1: Planting strip width – waive the Columbia Avenue Overlay District requirement for a planting strip of at least six feet along Columbia Avenue due to an existing sidewalk already in place that does not conform with this requirement. Seconded by Alderman Martin. Motion to **deny** MOS 1 carried unanimously 7-0.

Alderman Barnhill moved to approve MOS 2: Façade width – modify the Columbia Avenue Overlay District maximum building width requirement to allow a structure up to 217 feet in width. Seconded by Alderman Skinner. Motion to approve MOS 2 carried unanimously 7-0.

Alderman Barnhill moved to approve MOS 3: Roof slope – modify Columbia Avenue Overlay District roof slope requirement to allow roof slope of 4:12. Seconded by Alderman Bransford. Motion to approve MOS 3 carried unanimously 7-0.

Alderman Barnhill moved to approve MOS 4: Nonresidential architecture – modify Columbia Avenue Overlay District requirement to allow nonresidential structures to not resemble residential building types. Seconded by Alderman Martin. Motion to approve MOS 4 carried unanimously 7-0.

Alderman Barnhill moved to approve MOS 5: Siding – modify Columbia Avenue Overlay District wood siding and fibrous cement siding requirement to allow brick veneer in lieu of wood or cement siding. Seconded by Alderman Skinner. Motion to approve MOS 5 carried unanimously 7-0.
