**Up 1,969** more positive cases day over day in the State of Tennessee (271,771 total positive cases)

**Down** 967 less active cases day over day in the State of Tennessee (24,770 total active cases)

**Up 91** more positive cases day over day in Williamson County (7,911 total positive cases)


Up 9 More active cases day over day in Williamson County (819 total active cases)

**Up** Percent Positive / Total Tested at 8.8%

Level Williamson County seventh highest # of positive cases in Tennessee


**Down** One less death in Williamson County
