**Thanks!** While the name might be different, the impact is more important than ever: to provide meals to families in need. Don't forget about our "Give a Day. Serve a Day. Get a Day." campaign for United Way. If you give a total contribution of at least \$100 to United Way (I'd challenge you to consider giving the equivalent of one day's pay), and commit to volunteer at least 8 hours over the next year with your chosen cause (i.e. – non-profit, church, school, etc.), you can receive an EXTRA personal day in 2021. The additional personal day will be awarded on January 1, 2021 and must be used during the 2021 calendar year.

## Here are the details:

- Your 2021 pledge to United Way can take the form of a payroll deduction (spread over 26 paychecks in 2021) or as a one-time contribution, which ever works best for you. The minimum pledge to qualify is \$100. You should make your financial pledge using the attached United Way Pledge Form or request a form from Administration or Human Resources.
- We ask that you sign a 2021 volunteer pledge that includes your name, department, and the cause/organization(s) that you are committing to dedicate at least 8 hours of volunteer time (non-work hours) this coming year (attached). The choice of where and how you volunteer is up to you. You may also want to work with other City team members to volunteer as a group. - Once you have made both your United Way pledge and your volunteer pledge you will be credited with an additional personal day on January 1, 2021. The personal day must be used during the 2021 calendar year.

Williamson Medical Center is once again urging members of the community to continue to adhere to Centers for Disease Control and Prevention guidelines to help

reduce the spread of COVID-19. Over the past few weeks, Williamson Medical Center, similarly to other hospitals across the state, has reported a rise in COVID-19 hospitalizations. As of last week, Williamson Medical Center's COVID-19 inpatient census was up roughly 50% from two to three weeks prior, the hospital said in a news release, with a peak of 23 COVID-19 hospitalizations. ## Coronavirus Update: Thursday's COVID-19 case report 10/15/20):

As a City team we are doing very well. Our numbers are about as low as they have been since the beginning of the pandemic. Keep up the good work. Unfortunately, October has seen a surge in active case numbers for the community overall (a 64.5% increase in active cases since September 30<sup>th</sup>). Stay vigilant and exercising the safeguards for you, your family, other team members and the community.

Here are the most recent COVID numbers:

## **Key Changes:**

**Up 2,289 more** positive cases day over day in the State of Tennessee (222,827 total positive cases **most total positive cases since the pandemic began**)

**Up 554 more** active cases day over day in the State of Tennessee (19,799 total active cases)

**Up 80 more** positive cases day over day in Williamson County (6,274 total positive cases – **most total positive cases since the pandemic began**)


**Down 1 fewer** active cases day over day in Williamson County (619 total active cases)

Level Williamson County share of total positive cases within Tennessee at 2.8%

**Level** Percent Positive / Total Tested at **7.4%** 

**Level** Williamson County **sixth** highest # of positive cases in Tennessee

**Level** No additional deaths in Williamson County (47 – twelfth highest in state)





\*State of Tennessee changed definition of inactive/recovered cases from those individuals who were at least 21-days after first positive test to at least 14 days on September 3rd.
