**City departments gathered 22 bins of food for the Give Thanks United Way food drive**. Great work by our team! The holidays are an expensive time and can be especially difficult for families and individuals whose food budgets are already limited. The average family of four receives \$465 a month for food through public assistance programs, which breaks down to \$5.16 per meal. The average cost of a traditional holiday dinner is roughly \$60. That's 12 times the amount a family has available to spend on a single meal. For United Way's second-annual Give Thanks, **more than 500 groups, individuals and companies** collected food supplies and donated money for families throughout our region. Special thanks to **Administration's Vicki Parr** for organizing this food drive.

The Communications Division was hard at work yesterday producing the City's first Virtual Tree Lighting Ceremony. The program will debut Thanksgiving night at 6pm on Franklin TV and all the City Social Channels. Down 89 Fewer active cases day over day in Williamson County (1,512 total active cases )


Level Williamson County share of total positive cases within Tennessee at 3.1%
