An explosion in an outdoor Conex box or cargo container on the campus of Poplar Grove Middle School this morning appeared to have been caused by a leaking propane tank and space heater, according to Franklin Fire Marshal Andy King. There were no injuries and there was no damage to the school. The **Franklin Fire Department** was dispatched at 7:14 AM to the school at 2959 Del Rio Pike. King said the container was being used to store construction tools and serve as a workspace for construction workers. He said it appeared there was a propane leak

in the container overnight, which filled it with flammable gas. He said when a construction worker arrived at the site this morning, he started an electric space heater, which appeared to have ignited the gas, causing a substantial explosion. The blast was heard by several people in surrounding neighborhoods. School was getting ready to start at 7:30 AM. King said, "We're very fortunate that nobody was injured, because numerous students, parents, school buses, and staff were in the area at the time of the explosion." He said the worker was also uninjured, adding, "He was lucky because he was very close to the blast." **Great job by our Fire Department!**

In addition to numerous professional organizations – the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA), the Governmental Accounting Standard Board's (GASB) Governmental Accounting Standards Advisory Council, and various positions in the Tennessee Government Finance Officer's Association - TGFOA) – she has also served on the MC Alumni Board and the MC Board of Directors. But no matter how far she's risen, she says, her time as MC remains a foundation stone of both her professional and personal development. "Certainly, I still have wonderful friends from my time at Maryville College, and the memories and the encouragement from those years ago are still wonderful," she says. "Growing up in East Tennessee, going to Maryville College was something I wanted very much to do, and certainly the building blocks of the career that I went into was formed there at Maryville College."

As a reminder, the guidelines are as follows:


- Any employee can be nominated

- Completed nomination forms can be emailed to <u>nomination@franklintn.gov</u>


The deadline for submitting nominations for the 1st Quarter is February 4th!

- **Up 8,324 More** active cases day over day in the State of Tennessee (206,176 total active cases)
- **Up 484 More** positive cases day over day in Williamson County (55,076 total positive cases)
- **Up 214 More** active cases day over day in Williamson County (5,905 total active cases)
- **Level** Williamson County share of total positive cases within Tennessee at 3.2
- **Up** Percent Positive / Total Tested at **13.82%**
- Level Williamson County Sixth highest # of positive cases in Tennessee
