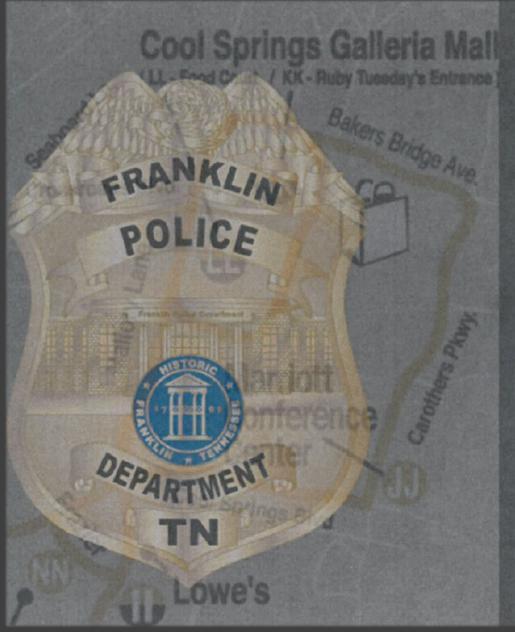

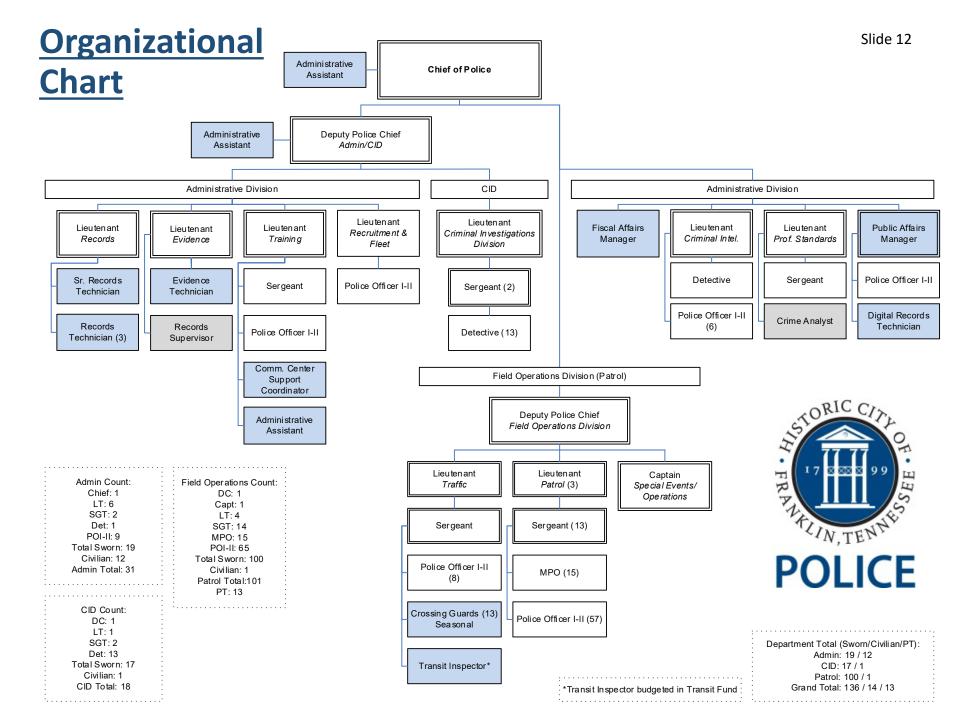

#### <u>Purpose of Department – Administration</u>

The Emergency Management Division was created in 2022 to provide overall direction and support for the City's Emergency Management function, Special Events & Continuity of Operations Plan. This is a two-man, 24 hour operation (on call, office, deployed) that supports City Residents, local stakeholders and County/State Emergency Personnel.

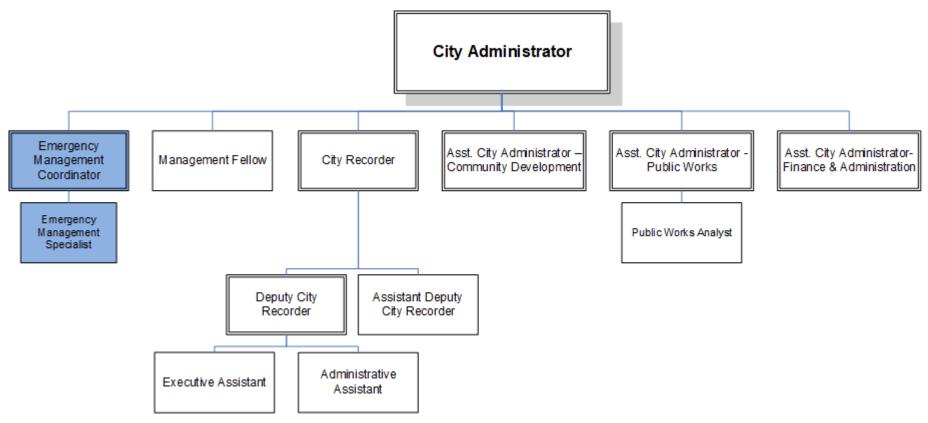
#### **Major Accomplishments**

- Completed the City's internal ASHER plan draft and began the outreach to all surrounding jurisdictions.
- Requested and successfully received two trailers from Williamson County for City use during emergencies, disasters, and field operations.
- Worked as a part of the TEMA AHIMT logistics planning group, to set up the state team logistical program.
- Completed the calendar year 2023/2024 special events EAP documentation.
- Completed the City's Debris Management plan as well as the final draft for the RFP documents.
- Built all Incident Action Plan's (IAP) for the calendar year's special events
- Maintained membership of the Middle TN Incident Management Team (IMT) and the All Hazards Incident Management Team (AHIMT), providing a statewide network of EM-relevant support.

### **Purpose of Department**

#### **Achievements:**

- 54,024 of training hours for the department including ISO, In-Service, medical, Special Ops. Etc. that's an average of 304 hours per person with 100% participation for In-Service
- E2 expected delivery date of March 2024
- T6 expected delivery date of December 2024
- E1 & E6 expected delivery date of September 2025



### **Purpose of Department**

#### Behavioral Health & Wellness Program Achievements:

The Behavioral Health Program continues to expand with the formation of multiple committees including the Peer Support Team, the Retirement Support Team, and the Marriage/ Family Support Team.

The Peer Support Team worked together to support Fire Department personnel with In-Service Training, numerous station visits, Potentially Traumatic Event defusing's, referrals to a variety of resources, and other miscellaneous peer support needs.

Behavioral Health In-Service Training was provided to the FFD (48 hours over 12 sessions) & the Franklin Police Department (60 hours over 15 sessions). Presentations were made to all Fire Department lateral hires.

Clinician Oversight was established with a provider who specializes in First Responder trauma.

The Referral Program continued to expand with the addition of numerous Behavioral Health providers.

In two years, the Behavioral Health Program was able to connect 39 individuals, including fire personnel, police personnel, and family with professional Behavioral Health providers.

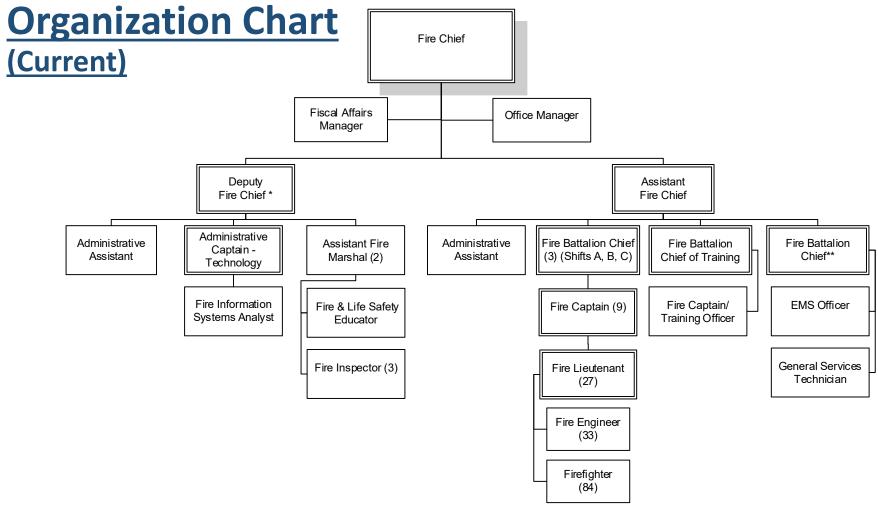

FY 2025 – Base budget requests \$22,990,474 for existing personnel and benefits.

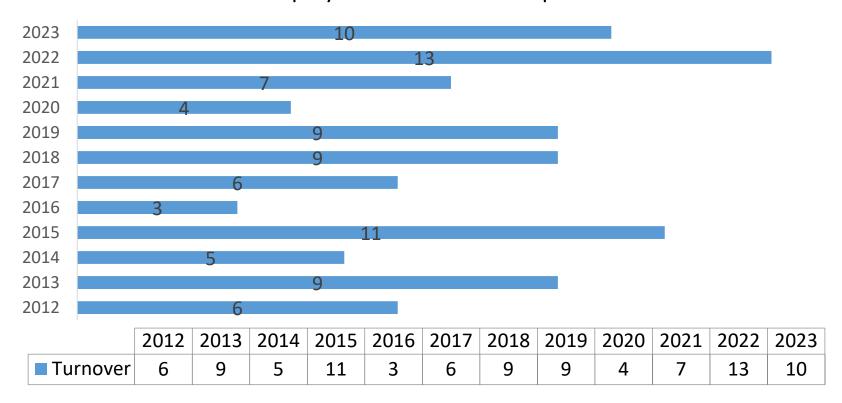
Personnel Budget is increasing by \$93,389 or 0.4%
